I'm an internationally renowned Persian artist who was born in Tehran, Iran, moved to the United States in 2005, and currently resides in Plano, Texas.

I have participated in numerous domestic & international exhibitions and ranked 1st place as an artist with an extraordinary ability. A CNN report back in 1996 described my work as "unrivaled," and the Iranian Minister of Culture honored me as an "Iranian Master of Art". The Iranian Cultural Heritage & Tourism Organization also nominated me as an outstanding artist who contributed to the fields of art & culture for the last 100 years. Additionally, the California senator presented the "Certificate of Special Recognition" to me in honor of outstanding community spirit & participation in the San Diego County Fair as a Design in Wood Competitor in 2018.

I'm highly recognized for my major contributions to the art of "inlay-on-wood" by adding 3D effect to my works. "Inlay on wood", known in Iran & Germany as "Moarraq/Marquetry", is the art of creating artistic images by inlaying small pieces of wood using a fretsaw. I describe my work as an effort to reveal the secrets of the wood's life. Every single arc and line on the work is either delicately selected natural grains or colors of the wood or an elaborate cutting trace. I use resin to create a unique and colorful background for each piece at the end. I currently have some of my artworks displayed at the Dragon Street Glass Gallery in Dallas Design District and won Best of Show, 1st Place & People's Choice awards in several art exhibitions nationally & internationally. Creative Woodworks & Crafts magazine conducted and published an interview about my artistic specialties as well. In addition to this, the Pearce Museum's Art Acquisition Committee has purchased one of my artworks, "The Spirit of Texas," for their permanent Western Art collection in 2021. I'm truly honored and beyond grateful to have my art in this Museum and be a part of a longstanding legacy!





George spent most of his life in Austin and moved to Bosque County in 1987 where he and Martha, his wife of 59 years, live on a ranch near Clifton, in a 1905 Victorian home known as Highview, which is set on the crest of a hill overlooking the Bosque River Valley. The Boutwell's have two daughters: Valerie 52, and Kimberlee 50, two grandsons: Josh 27 and Brady 24 and one Granddaughter, Kaylee 21. Hobbies and interests include Historic Preservation, Old Cars, fossil hunting, observation of wildlife and Longhorn Cattle.

George was Art Director for Texas Highways Magazine from 1966 to 1972 and became aware of the diversity of Texas during that time and this awareness has become the focus of his life's work. George has refused to specialize in one Genre of Art and only limits the scope of his work to Texas. He has been able to make his living exclusively from his Art for 50 Years!

The Boutwell's former home in Austin won a 1983 Austin Heritage Society Award which was presented at the Governor's Mansion. George was an appointed member of the Austin Historic Landmark Commission from 1982 to 1985.

Self-taught, George was too poor to afford Art Lessons and due to his failing half a year of High School because he was sitting in class drawing cars instead of studying, his grades were not sufficient to enter College. He read every Art book he could find in the Public Library and practiced continually, doing 100 sketches per day for one year! When he was finally able to afford Art Lessons it was because he had become a full time Professional Artist and had some disposable income for the first time in his life.

Given the title of "Official Texas State Artist" for 2006 by the Texas Commission on the Arts and the Texas State Legislature.

George recently published his first book "Texas in my Windshield" an autobiography and collection of short stories about his travels in Texas that features182 of his Paintings.







I challenge myself to work more efficiently by writing articles and blogs about different oil painting techniques and attending workshops. 

Bill Frank Mittag, a remarkable artist and storyteller, passed away on January 4, 2025, in Lubbock, Texas. Born in Ranger, Texas in 1935 and raised in Eunice, New Mexico, Bill's life was steeped in the landscapes and traditions of the American West—a theme that would come to define his artistic legacy. Bill graduated from New Mexico State University and pursued graduate studies at UCLA. Initially, he built a career as a healthcare administrator in Texas while also immersing himself in the cowboy lifestyle, spending weekends on the rodeo circuit with his beloved wife, Jean. However, health challenges eventually shifted his path, and Bill turned to art as a way to channel his experiences and connection to the West. Primarily self-taught, Bill refined his craft through workshops at the Scottsdale Artist School and with the Cowboy Artists of America. His oil paintings vividly depict the daily lives of Northern and Southern Plains Tribes, capturing peaceful camp settings and the spirit of the American West before the Great Western Migration. His semi-impressionistic style—featuring warm palettes and detailed focal points—invited viewers to step into historical moments and reflect on the transient nature of human existence within vast, rugged landscapes .



Judi Simon is a professional illustrator, graphic designer and medical artist whose career spans over 40 years in the commercial art, health education, medical illustration and consumer products fields.






